CIVIL ACTION – COMPLAINT

I. The Parties

1. Plaintiff, Jessica Lybrand (“Jessica”), is an adult and citizen of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and currently resides at the above-referenced location.

2. On October 29, 2018, Plaintiff, Jessica Lybrand was issued Letters of Administration by the Register of Wills of Dauphin County, appointing her as the Administratrix of the Estates of her deceased husband and daughter, Zachary Tyler Lybrand (“Zachary”) and [REDACTED] respectively. A true and correct copies of the Letters of Administration are attached hereto as Exhibit “A.”

3. Zachary and [REDACTED] were killed on October 12, 2018 in a twelve vehicle accident which was caused by a tractor-trailer driver who was intoxicated, driving with a suspended license, and who failed to recognize traffic that had stopped in his path as described more fully in this Complaint.

4. At all times relevant hereto, Plaintiffs, Jessica and Zachary Lybrand were lawfully married, and were the parents of [REDACTED] Lybrand who was only sixteen months old at the time of the accident.

5. Defendant, Greentree Logistics, Inc. (“Greentree”) is a corporation and/or other business entity, organized, operating and existing under the laws of Minnesota, with a principal place of business located at the above-captioned address.

6. Defendant, Jack Edward Satterfield, III (“Satterfield”), is an adult individual presently incarcerated at Dauphin County Prison, 501 Mall Rd, Harrisburg, PA 17111.

7. At all times relevant hereto, Defendant Satterfield was under contract as a truck driver and/or freight hauler with Defendant Greentree.

8. At all times relevant hereto, Defendant Satterfield was an employee and/or actual or apparent agent of Defendant Greentree acting within the course and scope of his employment and agency with Defendant Greentree.

9. Defendant, J.D. Eckman, Inc. (“Eckman”) is a corporate and/or other business entity, organized, operating, and existing under the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania with a registered office address and principal place of business located at 4781 Lower Valley Road, Atglen, Pennsylvania 19310.

10. At all times relevant hereto, all Defendants regularly and continuously conducted business in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, including the City and County of Philadelphia.

11. At all times relevant hereto, all Defendants acted individually and/or by and through their duly authorized actual and/or apparent agents, servants, workmen and/or employees, acting within the scope and course of their employment and/or agency with Defendants.

12. At all relevant times, all Defendants owed, undertook and/or assumed the duty to use reasonable, proper, adequate, and appropriate care and measures to avoid harm to foreseeable third parties, such as Zachary, [REDACTED] and Jessica Lybrand, which duties were breached by Defendants as set forth below.

II. The Facts

13. Prior to the collision of October 12, 2018 described below, Defendant Satterfield demonstrated a pattern of endangering public safety and violating the motor vehicle laws.

14. For example, on the date in question, Defendant Satterfield had an outstanding warrant for his arrest associated with a fare evasion traffic citation on April 14, 2018 in Cumberland County, Pennsylvania.

15. Moreover, at the time of the collision described below, Defendant Satterfield did not even have a valid Commercial Driver's License (CDL), as his license had been suspended in connection with his guilty plea to possession of drugs and drug paraphenalia in Mississippi, and it was therefore illegal and constituted a substantial risk to public safety for Defendant Satterfield to operate a commercial vehicle and/or tractor trailer. These facts were known, and/or should have been known by Satterfield's employer, Defendant Greentree, who nonetheless recklessly continued to contract with and/or employ him as a tractor trailer driver on the highways.

16. Defendant Greentree knew or should have known of Defendant Satterfield's record of irresponsible behavior, unsafe driving and the suspended status of his CDL before employing or contracting with Defendant Satterfield to haul cargo for Defendant Greentree.

17. On October 12, 2018, Defendant Greentree owned a Volvo truck-tractor which was being operated by Defendant Satterfield, northbound on Interstate 83 near Union Deposit Road in Dauphin County, Pennsylvania.

18. At the time of the collision, Defendant Satterfield was on dispatch by Defendant Greentree, while under contract with Defendant Greentree and serving as its employee, agent, and/or ostensible agent.

19. At the time of the collision, the Volvo truck-tractor was being operated in an unsafe manner and at an excessive rate of speed by Defendant Satterfield.

20. Prior to the collision described below, Plaintiff's decedent husband, Zachary, was also operating a motor vehicle northbound on Interstate 83 near Union Deposit Road in Dauphin County, Pennsylvania.

21. Zachary had just come from the home he shared with his wife, Jessica, and the couple's 16 month old daughter, [REDACTED].

22. In addition to marking the day of the horrific events described below, October 12, 2018 was the date of Jessica's 21st birthday, and the couple had planned to travel together to Zachary's mother's home to drop [REDACTED] off so that they could spend the evening celebrating with friends.

23. It was going to be [REDACTED] first night away from her parents, and the longest period of time that her mother had ever spent apart from her, as Jessica had not returned to work after giving birth to [REDACTED], the couple's first and only child.

24. In fact, Jessica and Zachary were concerned that [REDACTED] would not be able to sleep at her grandmother's house apart from her parents, so Jessica spent part of the day on October 11, 2018, preparing all of the things that [REDACTED] would need to be as comfortable as possible during her first night away from her parents: washing her favorite blankets and pajamas, packing her diaper bag and stuffed animals, and cleaning her pillow, which had also been Zach's childhood pillow.

25. During the afternoon of October 12, 2018, Jessica and Zachary ran errands while a friend babysat [REDACTED]

26. As the afternoon progressed into the evening on October 12, 2018, and Jessica and Zachary returned to their home, it became clear that the couple was running behind schedule.

27. In order to allow Jessica to get ready for her birthday celebration, Zachary agreed to take [REDACTED] to his mother's house while Jessica remained at the Lybrand home to shower and get dressed.

28. As the Lybrand's were preparing for their evening, Defendant Satterfield was consuming double-shot Margaritas and beer in a Mexican restaurant, to the point where

Satterfield was clearly intoxicated as he climbed into his multi-ton tractor trailer and started on this fatal route.

29. Around 7:45 p.m., Jessica got the things she had packed for [REDACTED] and began placing them in the car as the friend who had been babysitting took [REDACTED] and placed her in the rear-facing car seat.

30. Jessica then kissed her daughter goodbye and told Zachary she loved him and would see him shortly when he returned from dropping [REDACTED] off. As Zachary and [REDACTED] pulled out of the family's driveway, this marked the last time Jessica ever saw them alive.

31. About 15 minutes later, Zachary was stopped in traffic on northbound I-83 near Union Deposit Road.

32. Traffic was at a standstill because Defendant Eckman was performing a \$104.7 million dollar construction project on I-83, and on the evening in question, this Defendant had carelessly, negligently, and recklessly failed to protect drivers with adequate warnings of the alterations they had caused in traffic patterns, and they had created hazards that caused traffic slow and/or stop suddenly and with inadequate warning.

33. In fact, since the construction project commenced, the Colonial Park Fire Department that responds to vehicular crashes along this corridor of I-83 has seen an 80% increase in the number accidents that require an emergency response. PennDOT data likewise demonstrates a substantial increase in motor vehicle accidents in this area since the construction project began.

34. The roadway was dry and there were no adverse conditions due to weather.

35. At about the same time, and at all relevant times hereto, Defendant Satterfield, acting as an employee, agent, and/or apparent agent of Defendant Greentree in the course and

scope of his employment and agency with Defendant Greentree, was driving the Volvo truck-tractor northbound on I-83 at a high rate of speed, heading directly for the stopped traffic in which Zachary and [REDACTED] were sitting helplessly.

36. As Defendant Satterfield sped toward Zachary and [REDACTED] at an excessive and dangerous rate of speed, his blood-alcohol level was well over the legal limit and constituted a severe danger to the drivers with whom he shared the highway that night.

37. As a result of Defendant Satterfield's unsafe speed and excessive blood-alcohol level, he failed to observe or perceive the traffic jam in which Zachary and [REDACTED] were stopped, failed to stop, slow down, or take evasive maneuvers, and caused the front of his truck-tractor to strike the rear of Zachary and [REDACTED] vehicle.

38. The impact of the collision was so violent that it started a chain reaction of impacts involving a total of twelve (12) vehicles which were either stopped or moving slowly.

39. Immediately following the impact, Defendant Satterfield exited his cab and fled from the scene, crossing over the southbound lane of traffic on I-83 and running to the parking lot of a nearby hotel where he watched the aftermath of the mayhem he had caused.

40. Defendant Satterfield did not call for emergency medical assistance for the victims of the collision, nor did he stop during his flight to check on or render aid to them, including Zachary and [REDACTED].

41. As a result of the impact, Zachary and [REDACTED] vehicle caught fire and became engulfed in flames, with each of them trapped inside the twisted metal frame unable to escape.

42. As a result of the impact and subsequent fire, Plaintiff's decedent, Zachary Lybrand, suffered catastrophic and fatal injuries with which he suffered in anguish before expiring due to smoke inhalation and thermal burns.

43. As a result of the impact and subsequent fire, Plaintiff's decedent, [REDACTED] Lybrand, suffered catastrophic and fatal injuries with which she suffered in anguish before expiring due to smoke inhalation and thermal burns.

44. At the time of their deaths, Zachary was 24 years old. [REDACTED] was only 16 months old.

45. This accident was caused due to the recklessness, negligence, carelessness and intentional misconduct of the Defendant Satterfield as set forth throughout this Complaint.

46. Plaintiffs are entitled to recover punitive damages against Defendant Satterfield.

47. This accident was also caused by the reckless indifference and complete disregard for the safety of motorists exhibited by the Defendant Greentree, who disregarded the fact that Satterfield had a suspended license, an outstanding traffic warrant, and a history of unsafe conduct, but nonetheless hired him and placed him behind the wheel of one of their multi-ton tractor trailers and sent him over the course of our highways.

48. Plaintiffs are entitled to recover punitive damages against Defendant Greentree.

49. This accident was also caused by the negligence of the Defendant Eckman, who failed to take appropriate measures to protect and safeguard the motorists travelling through the construction zones and hazards that they created as set forth in this Complaint.

Plaintiffs demand all lawful damages for the wrongful death of Zachary Lybrand for all persons entitled to recover such damages, including damages for medical expenses, expenses of estate administration, the loss of expected pecuniary contributions of the decedent, and the loss of decedent's care, comfort, companionship, society, consortium, guidance and tutelage.

54. Plaintiffs further demand punitive damages against these Defendants.

WHEREFORE, Plaintiffs demand judgment in their favor and against Defendants, and claim of Defendants a sum in excess of the jurisdictional limit for arbitration in compensatory and punitive damages, with lawful interest thereon, damages pursuant to Rule 238, and costs of suit.

Plaintiffs demand all lawful damages for the wrongful death of Zachary Lybrand for all persons entitled to recover such damages, including damages for medical expenses, expenses of estate administration, the loss of expected pecuniary contributions of the decedent, and the loss of decedent's care, comfort, companionship, society, consortium, guidance and tutelage.

WHEREFORE, Plaintiffs demand judgment in their favor and against Defendants, and claim of Defendants a sum in excess of the jurisdictional limit for arbitration, in compensatory damages, with lawful interest thereon, damages pursuant to Rule 238, and costs of suit.
